Scholarship Leadership

The C of E Alumni Association scholarship program is at the core of our service to our school's heritage and to the families of alumni and staff. Over the past 16 years we have awarded scholarships to 90 students worth \$164,000. Additional independently administered C of E scholarship programs at Sterling College and Emporia State bring the total of awarded scholarships to over \$200,000.

All of this has been accomplished under the guidance and leadership of **Clarence "Clancy" Howland, A59**. His passing has created an immediate need in a core leadership position in your alumni association. We are in need of a volunteer to step up to this responsibility.

The principal component of this job requires activity mostly in a two-month period (April and May). The Scholarship Committee Chair receives the applications by the April 1 deadline and distributes copies, with

names redacted, to alumni evaluators who each work from their home to rate the applicants. The evaluators then return the information to the committee chair who tabulates the results and announces the winners.

The chair is responsible for notifying the applicants and contacting the colleges or universities slated to receive the scholarship money. It is also the chair's responsibility to work with the alumni association treasurer to get the scholarship checks out in a timely fashion. The new chair will also be encouraged to examine the mechanics and direction of the program and bring any suggested changes to the board.

Defender of Democracy

Editor's Note: There are a number of excellent books, written by C of E alumni or former Professors. My hope is to do a review of one of these books in each future issue of this newsletter. It should be noted that this intent is an aspiration rather than a commitment.

William Allen White, X1886 (WAW), certainly owes the portion of his education that took place at C of E some of the credit for formulating his views. Those views continue to be examined up to the present day.

William Allen White, Defender of Democracy, 1919-1944 by **Jack Traylor, PhD, A68**, is a newly published book that focuses on WAW's overriding belief in democracy as being the world's best form of government. The book is interesting on many levels. Many of White's thoughts provide a lens for us to view some of today's controversies and situations from a thought-provoking perspective.

This book is not simply another WAW biography. The focus is on his political views rather than on the events of his life. He is remembered as having a progressive label, but there was much more complexity to his views. He defines democracy as "the institutionalized expression of the Christian philosophy in ordinary life."

Traylor's premise is that this view of White's came to fruition in the wake of World War I and remained a constant for the remainder of his life. His views were important because of both his insights and his notable influence on the thinking of ordinary Americans and the political leaders of the day.

"White viewed democracy primarily as a social order which encouraged the kindly impulses of humanity." He saw democracy as "an aspiration toward justice." This aspiration caused citizens to have a "concern ... for

their neighbor's welfare." White believed that he lived in a civilization that marked its progress with ever-increasing kindness. (What would White think of today's United States where civil discourse sometimes appears to be on the verge of extinction?)

He was also a strong advocate for education. He believed that education should develop "a capacity for trained attention." Moreover, "White thought an education should produce tolerance, intellectual curiosity and a working knowledge of ... science, the arts, commerce and industry." He "believed Christian colleges produced the type of education he advocated much better than state colleges and universities did."

The reader of this book is, of course, not expected to completely accept or reject all of White's thinking. Decide for yourselves if his beliefs may have to some extent informed our education at C of E. Moreover, his thinking might provide framework that can sharpen our view of today's world. Note also that White's own beliefs were never completely locked in. "He believed truth was seldom static."

This book is recommended.

Declining To Renew Rivalry

In 1954 the possibility of renewing the football rivalry between C of E and Emporia State was being widely discussed and promoted in the community and on both campuses. Key people and leadership from both community and campus were, however, emerging as vocally opposed.

Ed Shupe, FF, was a columnist for the Emporia Gazette before he went to work for C of E. His regular column, "Now Hear This" flatly stated, "It seems that such a game would not accomplish near the good that it would bad. For one thing, the town would be divided again between two camps. As it is now, people have forgotten the bitter rivalry that used to exist between supporters of the schools and between the students themselves. No more are there fights among the students because of their

athletic rivalry, and no more is the town divided into those favoring C of E and those favoring Emporia State." The Emporia State student newspaper, The Bulletin, seemed to share the view that renewal of this formerly traditional gridiron clash would have disastrous consequences. They foresaw the loss of "the friendship and cooperation of the C of E student body. At present, E-Staters have many close friends on the campus of C of E. This could be lost in the time it takes to play one football game."

We will never know whether renewal of the rivalry would, in fact, have destroyed civility and rent the community into two warring factions. C of E and Emporia State were never again to meet on a football field.



Because of its affiliation with the Presbyterian Church, C of E always had many alumni who went on to become ministers, missionaries, minister's spouses or active members, often in leadership roles, in their local churches. Therefore, when the church gathered together in various cities across the US in its General Assembly, there was typically a "mini-reunion" of C of E alumni. The above photo was taken at the 208th General Assembly, held in July 1996 in Albuquerque,

During her life she sang with church and symphony choirs, directed children's choirs, and, in her previous home in Bartlesville, OK, she was a leader in the local Musical Research Society and Community Concert Association. Four children, six grandchildren and two great grandchildren survive her.

Marjorie (Ingold) Denniston, A47, of Durham, NC died May 31, 2019 at age 93. After her marriage, she and her husband settled in Newton, IA where she taught physical education, music and math. She served for twelve years on the Newton city council. Also active in her church, she was the first woman elected and ordained as a Presbyterian Elder in her Newton church. Her husband and her brother **Robert "Bob" Ingold, A56**, predeceased her. Her sister, **Rosemary (Ingold) Manchester, A49**, sister-in-law, **Ruth (Addleman) Ingold, A56**, three children, four grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren survive her.

Howard "Lloyd" Carnine, A48 (?), of Warrensburg, MO passed away June 4, 2019 at age 97. He was a U.S. Navy WWII veteran who attended C of E after the war. Four daughters, eight grandchildren, twelve great-grandchildren and three great great-grandchildren survive him.

Charles F. Spurlock, X48, of Dallas, TX passed away March 14, 2016 at age 89. He was a U.S. Navy WWII veteran who attended C of E after the war. He went on to become the founder and president of Empire General Life Insurance Company of Texas. His three children, four grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren survive him.

John D. McConnell, X49, of Burlington, KS passed away October 4, 2018 at age 91. He served in the U. S. Army in WWII and attended C of E after the war. A niece and nephew survive him.

Roy John Apel, X50, of Santa Clara, CA passed away April 7, 2015 at age 87. He was a U. S. Navy WWII veteran who, after the war, went to C of E where he met his wife, **Paula Shaffer, X50**. Roy's career was as a diplomat with the U. S. Foreign Service. In this role, he and his family lived in a variety of European and Latin American countries. After retirement, Roy returned to his native California. Paula, five children, ten grandchildren and a great-grandson survive him.

Maxine (Flowers) Roberson, X50, of Bloomington, MN passed away February 10, 2019 at age 91. She was known as a highly talented author whose published works included a variety of children's and spiritual books, poems and short stories. She was president of the Minnesota Branch of the National League of American Pen Women who taught creative writing classes in the Minneapolis Public Schools. Four children and five grandchildren survive her.

Dr. Frank E. Colaw, X51, of Las Vegas, NV passed away April 5, 2016 at age 88. After graduation from Emporia High School, he joined the U. S. Army Air Corps where he served as an MP. Afterwards, he went to C of E and then completed his BA in Education at Emporia State. During this time he married his first wife, **Mary Ellen (Gunzelman) Colaw, A49**. Subsequently, he earned a Masters in Education from Vanderbilt and his Doctorate from KU. He began his career as a teacher and then became a principal. He was the Principal at Van Buren Elementary in Topeka when it was initially desegregated under the historic Brown v. Board of Education Supreme Court decision. He subsequently, served as a school district Superintendent in four different districts before retiring. Two sons, three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren survive him.

Effie C. (Dean) Heller, X51, of Holton, KS passed away November 11, 2018 at age 89. Effie and her husband farmed. In addition, Effie was the owner and operator of a truck stop and an antique business. Later in life, she discovered her passion for cartography and worked in the County Appraiser's office for many years. Five children, fourteen grandchildren and eighteen great-grandchildren survive her.

Elizabeth "Betty" Jean "Zip" (Zinzer) Mordy, A52, of Fairway, KS passed away January 15, 2019 at age 88. Betty was a master gardener who was deeply involved in her community. She was an advocate for the planting of trees in her community and served as a docent for the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art. She was active in her church, the DAR and the AAUW. Her husband, **Dean Mordy, A55**, predeceased her. Three children, nine grandchildren and three great-grandchildren survive her.

Esther "Es" (Longenecker) Cummins, A54, of Wichita died June 18, 2019 at age 87. She worked and was active in her church, serving at various times as Christian Education Director and organist. She was artistically talented and will be remembered for her quilting and sewing projects. Also, she worked for eleven years at Butler Community College and gave piano and violin lessons in her home. Three children, six grandchildren, one grandchild and sister **Marge (Longenecker) McCabe, A57**, survive her.

Norma Gooden, A54, of Arvada, CO passed away January 26, 2019 at age 87. After graduation she taught school for two years and then went to France with the Red Cross. After two years abroad, she returned to Wichita as Director of Junior Red Cross. Subsequently, she transferred to Denver, CO as Junior Red Cross Director. From there she went on to a long career in real estate sales until retirement. Her sister **Letha (Gooden) Gardner, X57**, survives her.

La Quita (Wood) Walker, X54, of Hays, KS died November 16, 2016 at age 85. She was a registered nurse with a nursing degree from Newman Hospital. She worked for many years for Hadley Hospital in Hays. Two children, six grandchildren, six great-grandchildren and one great great-grandchild survive her.

Rev. Myron E. White, A54, of Albuquerque, NM passed away in January 2019 at age 86. After graduating with a degree in Biology from C of E, Myron married **Norma (Douglas) White, A54**, and together they attended San Francisco Theological Seminary, graduating with a Master's of Divinity. Subsequently, Myron served as a missionary/pastor in Nevada, Montana, Alaska, Kansas, Minnesota, Arizona and New Mexico. In addition to his pastoral duties, Myron found time to serve as camp director of Camp Chimney Spring near Cloudcroft, NM and to put his interest in science to work by volunteering for over 5,000 hours as a docent at the New Mexico Museum of Natural History and Science. His wife of 64 years, Norma, four children, one grandson, six step-grandchildren and two step great-grandchildren survive him.

Stanley W. Hamilton, X55, of Lawrence, KS passed away May 26, 2017 at age 83. Stan received his degree in Journalism from KU and began his career as a reporter and then copy editor for the Kansas City Star. In 1957 he moved to Washington, D.C. where he lived and worked in journalism, trade association and government positions for 47 years. After retirement he returned to Kansas and wrote the book *Machine Gun Kelly's Last Stand*. At the time of his death, Stan was working on an unfinished book about small colleges in Kansas, including C of E. The book's working title was *Where Did All the Kansas Colleges Go?* Stan's mother **Margaret (Stanley) Hamilton, A28**, was a C of E graduate. Stan's first wife, four children and four grandchildren survive him.

Gary G. Dalquest, X57 (?), of Wilsey, KS died June 14, 2019 at age 83. He was a successful farmer who gave back to his community, serving as local rural fire chief and as part of the Executive Board of the county Extension Council. His wife, two children, four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren survive him.

Dorothy "Dottie" Switzer, A58, of San Diego, CA died June 26, 2018 at age 81. She graduated from C of E in only three years and later earned two master's degrees in psychology from National University in San Diego. After graduation from C of E, she taught Home Economics in Wichita; later she taught elementary and special education students for many years in San Diego. She loved to travel, visiting every continent, and especially enjoyed cruises with her younger sister Marilyn, conveniently a travel agent. She also joined several of her C of E roommates and suite-mates in Road Scholar programs in the US. Two children, two grandchildren and two sisters survive her.

Clarence "Clancy" Howland, A59, of Emporia passed away July 15, 2019 at age 83. At C of E he lettered all four years in track and football. He has been inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame. After C of E he received a MS degree from Emporia State and embarked on a career teaching and coaching. His final 26 years of teaching were at Emporia High School where he was honored multiple times as an Outstanding Educator. His post retirement hobby was antique cars. He also had a longtime commitment of service to his church and the C of E Alumni Association. His wife, **Verla Jean (Hoke) Howland, A58**, two sons and five grandchildren survive him. His brother, **John E. "Scat" Howland, A66**, predeceased him.

David C. Muck, A61, of Pleasanton, CA passed away January 10, 2016 at age 76. After graduation from C of E, Dave obtained a master's degree from Emporia State. He then took a position as a teacher in California. He moved on to work for a building materials supplier and then transitioned into the telecommunications business. He retired from Tower Communications as president/CEO at the age of 59. His parents, a son and his brother, **Arthur Muck, A64**, predeceased him. His wife, a daughter, two granddaughters, a sister and another brother, **Dr. Steven Muck, A58**, survive him.

Marta (Turner) Salvione, X61, of Brighton, CO passed away January 16, 2019 at age 80. After C of E, Marta went to Winthrop College in South Carolina where she received her degree in Spanish and English. She taught school at several locations while her husband served in the military. After returning to Colorado, she taught at several Denver schools. She taught elementary school, bilingual elementary education and English as a second language. She retired from the Denver Public Schools in 1993. Her three children survive her.

William "Bill" Majors, A64, of Meriden, KS passed away February 24, 2019 at age 76. After C of E, Bill earned a Master's in Administration from UMKC and a Doctorate of Education from KU. He started his career teaching science in Denver and then returned to Kansas teaching in Shawnee Mission. There he rose to vice principal and then became the first principal at Blue Valley Middle School in 1977. In 1990, Bill became Superintendent of the Jefferson West School District. He finished his career serving as Assistant Executive Director at the Kansas Association of School Boards. Bill's wife of 54 years, **Betty (Pilger) Majors, A64**, two children and three grandchildren survive him.

Dr. Hugh Edward Faulkner Jones, A65, of Lansing, MI passed away September 23, 2018 at age 75. At C of E he met his

"lifelong mentor" **Fran Broadhurst, FF**, and his former wife **Vernell (Davis) Jones, A67**, who survives him. After C of E, Hugh earned an MDiv from McCormick Theological Seminary, a MSW from the University of Illinois, Chicago and both a MA in Psychology and a PhD in Clinical Psychology from Michigan State University. Over the years he worked as a teacher, caseworker, counselor, professor, dean of students, chaplain and psychologist. He worked 22 years for Steelcase Industry until his retirement. He was a Red Cross volunteer, a golden member of NAACP and a founding member of the Association of Black Psychologists. His partner of 35 years, Jim Ferguson, two sons, seven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren survive him.

John E. "Scat" Howland, A66, of Lawrence, KS passed away April 17, 2019 at age 75. At C of E he was an outstanding athlete, setting records in track and named All-Conference in football twice. His junior year he was an honorable mention NAIA Football All-American. Scat is in the C of E Athletic Hall of Fame. He was a Professor of Psychology at Haskell Indian Nations University. His wife, two children, a granddaughter, his brother, **Clarence "Clancy" Howland, A59**, and a sister survived him.

Robert J. Rutzen, A66, of Grayslake, IL passed away December 10, 2017. His former wife, **Dagmar (Kosack) Rutzen, A66**, and two children survive him.

Billy Lee "Bill" Linhart, A68, of Emporia died March 7, 2019 at age 72. At C of E Bill was an outstanding basketball player who broke a long-standing single game scoring record with 41 points in a game against Sterling. He had 1,076 career points and is a member of the C of E Athletic Hall of Fame. After C of E Bill earned a master's degree from Emporia State. He coached and taught in several Kansas school districts before returning to Emporia in 1977, where he taught for 29 years and coached basketball from 1977-1981. He also was a Kansas high school and college basketball official for more than 35 years and is a member of the Kansas Collegiate Officials Hall of Fame. His wife, two daughters, four grandchildren, a brother, **Fred Linhart, X71**, and a sister survive him.

Janice (Gile) Supon, A69, of Topeka passed away November 9, 2018 at age 71. She was a public school music teacher, gave piano lessons in her home and was active in church choirs. For many years she provided piano accompaniment, musical direction and appeared on stage at Topeka's Helen Hocker Theatre. She also worked as a musical educator with the Kansas Neurological Institute and the local Juvenile Detention Center. Her husband, two children and two grandchildren survive her.

Arthur L. "Art" Campbell, A70, of Lawrenceville, GA passed away April 11, 2019 at age 72. He owned Campbell Sod Farm and served a term as President of Turfgrass Producers International. His former wife, two children and seven grandchildren survive him.

Willie Winston Miles, A73, of Richmond, VA died March 23, 2019 at age 71. Before going to C of E, Willie served in the U.S. Air Force in Vietnam. At C of E he was a part of the 1973 HAAC Conference basketball championship team. After C of E he earned a degree in civil engineering from the New Jersey Institute of Technology and an MBA from Baldwin-Wallace College. As a civil engineer he created and developed the necessary infrastructure to support nuclear systems in nuclear power plants. Subsequently, he designed, planned and implemented infrastructure solutions for the Virginia state government. His mother, wife, three children and fourteen grandchildren survive him.

Fond Memory

Jack Gilmore, A59, shares here a memory of a C of E icon. He writes, "I was 22 years old, fresh out of the military, when I enrolled at the College of Emporia in 1955. Since the Korean War was on during part of my military deployment, I was eligible for the GI Bill (which provided a lot of financial help.) As a freshman I worked in the evenings helping a farm couple milk cows. Then to my delight the football coach got me a job in the

dining hall. I was one of two 'bus boys'. The director and boss of the dining hall was Janie Mae Lunsford, FS. Everyone called her Janie Mae. Janie Mae treated me like a son, and I did my best to squelch criticism of her food. I was an experienced, young, burly man then, and I did not put up with anyone who thought they could 'bully' the cook. As far as I was concerned, the food was always good – morning, noon and night.

"I taught Janie Mae to drive a car when she was in her 60's. When Janie Mae drove 60 miles for my younger sister's funeral in 1960, I embarrassed her and cried. Janie Mae is among my fondest memories of C of E."
