## MISSED THE REUNION?

For various reasons, some alumni who would have liked to attend last summer's successful reunion were unable to make the trip to Emporia. Some alumni haven't returned to Emporia since their college days.

While the bus tour of Emporia to see what changes have taken place, and what familiar landmarks remain and the interior of the beautiful restored Granada Theatre cannot be viewed on the internet, campus scenes and information about changes in the former college landscape are available to interested alumni.

The alumni association website [www.c-of-e.org](http://www.c-of-e.org) has a virtual tour, originally put together in 2006 by the late **Dr. John Spencer, A70**. The site's webmasters have updated the tour since.

Included are historic photos that predate our time on campus, such as an aerial view of the campus from around 1920 and a photo of the first building on the campus, Stuart Hall. Photos of remembered buildings from an active campus are coupled with pictures of the same buildings as they appear today. Included are Kenyon Hall, Anderson Memorial Library, Mabee Science Hall, Vollmer Hall Men's Dorm, the Devore Campus Center and the Laughlin-Lewis Library. Other buildings, which no longer exist, are shown along with their sites as they are today. These include Mason Gymnasium, Emporia Hall and Dunlap Hall. Even early and current views of Lake Mergendahl are included.

Attendees at the reunion were privileged to be able to visit the dome in the Anderson Memorial Library and search for their names that they had written upon the occasion of their graduation. Unfortunately, not all names remain, as some were painted over by the Way College. Alumni can search for their names virtually, thanks to a significant project done by the Emporia State University Archives. ## Air War in the Pacific

The Emporia Gazette, as part of a special 2016 Veterans Day supplement, wrote an article about the wartime experience of **George Crocker, A49, FF**. After about a year and a half at C of E, he entered the US Navy. He served in the Pacific in the latter stages of WWII as a gunner aboard a PB4-Y-2 aircraft. This plane was a somewhat enlarged version of the B-24 bomber.

Crocker's squadron was based in the Mariana Islands. His plane was a part of the invasion of Iwo Jima. The plane made a landing on the first airstrip captured by the allies, even though the Japanese still controlled the end of the strip and were firing mortars at them. In the heat of battle and without any form of air traffic control, planes on the ground struggled to avoid other planes, some disabled, that were coming in for emergency landings.

Crocker survived numerous engagements with enemy ships and planes. He believes that the reason that he is still alive today is that his training was superior to what the Japanese were giving to their recruits near the end of the war.

Nevertheless, the time came when Crocker's squadron had lost so many planes and personnel that they were transferred

to Palawan in the Philippines, which was supposed to be easier duty. However, it was during this period that Crocker's plane found itself under attack by three planes and a cruiser. In a tense encounter the PB4-Y-2 shot down two of the planes, chased off the third enemy fighter and eluded the "ack-ack" fire from the cruiser. At the end of the war, only three planes remained of the original fifteen planes in Crocker's squadron.

After returning home, Crocker attended the graduation of his class at C of E. He was surprised when those present greeted his appearance with emotion and hugs. He learned that his name was on a plaque listing those who had been killed in the war. The student who had died was **George Crawford, X43**. The mix-up was quickly corrected.

Subsequently, Crocker completed his education at C of E, earned an MA in dramatic arts from the University of Denver and eventually returned to C of E where he chaired the Art and Drama Department from 1958 through 1961. More recently, as has been reported previously in this newsletter, he created seven luminous paintings that are a vital part of the restoration of Emporia's Granada Theatre.

## The First Veterans Day

Emporia is the founding city of Veterans Day. The first-ever Veterans Day parade was held in Emporia on November 11, 1953. A trio of C of E graduates chaired this event's Program Committee. They were **Ernest Cipra, A35, Deloy Heath, A35** and **Dr. John C. Patton, A37**. Heath also served as the treasurer of the event's organizing committee.

The Program Committee put together a full slate of activities for the day. A parade kicked off the day's events. Attendance and participation was outstanding as schools and about ninety percent of Emporia's stores closed for the day.

At 11:00 a.m. civil-defense sirens, church bells and power plant whistles all sounded. This acknowledged the signing of the armistice that ended World War I at 11:00 a.m. on the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918. Following the whistles

and bells, the American Legion Drum and Bugle Corps played "Taps." This was then echoed by the Kansas City AmVets Drum and Bugle Corps.

Afterwards, free hot dogs, beans and coffee were served in the basement of the Civic Auditorium. A wheelchair basketball game was played between the Rolling Pioneers of Kansas City and a team of locals, including **Leslie Hayes, A52**. The day ended with a free dance and a free movie at the drive-in movie theater.

After the successful celebration, Emporia Congressman Ed Rees introduced a bill making Emporia's innovation a national holiday. It passed the House and the Senate and was signed into law by President Eisenhower. The nation then held its first Veterans Day on November 11, 1954.

## Community Service

**Ruth Anne (McDonald) Trowbridge, X61**, was honored in November with the Girl Scout Woman of Distinction Award.

Ruth Anne's ties to Girl Scouts began when she became a Brownie at age 8. She moved through Girl Scouts to attain a First Class Pin. Then, while at C of E, she spent a summer in primitive conditions working as a scout camp counselor.

In 1974, as a mother, she returned to scouting as a Brownie leader. She led her Brownie troop for two years and then led her Junior troop for three years. Every summer during this time she worked at a Girl Scout Day Camp. Working as an advisor and song leader, she also taught children crafts and entertained them with games. As her daughters moved to adulthood, Ruth Anne's commitment to Girl Scouts continued. She put on

programs for various troops and took leadership positions as needed in various Brownie and Girl Scout troops. She also served the Mile Hi (Greater Denver area) council as delegate and then as Council Chair. She was honored for her service with the Council's Bronze Award and with a national award of an Appreciation Pin from the Girl Scouts of the USA.

Ruth Anne lived in various places in Colorado. After teaching second grade for four years, Ruth resigned to raise her family. Subsequently she served for thirty-nine years as a substitute teacher. She also taught Sunday School for thirty-one years. Throughout this entire period she remained active in Girl Scouts and an example of community service that characterizes many C of E alumni.

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## C of E Room


C of E Alumni Association President **Roger Klein, A72** was a guest at the October 15, 2016, celebration of the 25th Anniversary of the Sauder Alumni Center on the campus to Emporia State University. The financial assistance of our alumni association in the establishment of the center was recognized when Roger was introduced. Room 16 in this building is the College of Emporia Room, as can be seen in the photo accompanying this article.

Inside of the room is a plaque headlined, "College of Emporia Room." The text on the marker reads, "Donors to the College of Emporia Room, otherwise known as 'C of E,' are alumni and friends of the College of Emporia, 1882-1973. The College of Emporia was a four-year Liberal Arts institution founded by the Presbyterian Church. C of E produced graduates who went on to become doctors, lawyers, business leaders, educators, ministers, missionaries, and thoughtful citizens of their communities. Those who taught and studied there are forever touched by the "Fighting Presby" spirit of the College of Emporia."

Another large plaque in the room recognizes individual contributors to the alumni association's gift. Over 100 names of C of E alumni appear on individual plaques placed below the big marker. C of E is well remembered on the Emporia State campus.

At its January meeting, the C of E Alumni Association Board approved a "Memorandum of Agreement" with the Emporia State University Foundation and the Emporia State University Alumni Association recognizing C of E naming rights. The C of E room will feature a memorabilia

display case. Use of the room will be available to your alumni association at no charge.

His wife, brother **Adrian Apel, A50**, two children and six grandchildren survive him.
