President's Message

"Long Live Stuart Hall"

At our last Alumni Association Board meeting in July I started the meeting with a song sung by all. I no longer remember how I came into possession of a book titled "Songs of the Western Colleges" published by Hinds and Noble. But, looking through the almost 200 songs included, there were a handful from KCAC schools. One was "Long Live Stuart Hall". That of course is a reference to the main building prior to Kenyon Hall, which was destroyed by fire.

The book's copyright is 1902. Many of the songs are school songs. Others are songs that college glee clubs often sang. The words to our song were penned by Chester H.C. Dudley. With the keen research of Jean Gilmore, our past president, we discover that Chester was a student that graduated from C of E in 1902. So it was a student who wrote the words. He went on to receive a master's degree from Baker Univ. and even studied at Princeton Theological Seminary as well. He

started teaching in New Hampshire in 1909 at a new "Normal School" there. Many of their teachers were from Emporia because of the Normal School in Emporia. He undoubtedly returned to Emporia at some point because he was the organist at the Emporia Methodist Church for 30 years.

The tune is borrowed from "Viva La Compagnie". There are three verses and a chorus.

The verses are intriguing as the second verse includes the words "We sing of our faculty handsomely paid"!!! The chorus is even more interesting for it is, "Alara, alara, alarara, Alara, alara, alarara, Yol ya, Yol ya, Yol ya, Yol ya, C of E Rah, Rah, Rah!" (spelling from the book). Now the question becomes... did "Ein, Zwei, Drei" precede or follow this song? Anyone who wants the words let me know, and I will gladly supply them. Just email me don_schroeder@att.net.

They thought it sounded great and so they convinced my Uncle to let me perform this song again at their next performance which was a local outside concert. As life often takes us in different directions, I got more involved in sports in High School and less involved in my music. I did however manage to be in a band and was the lead singer for approximately 2 years. I would also get together with different guys to sing a cappella renditions of various popular songs. We would love to go down to the boardwalk in Long Branch and Asbury Park during the summer nights and sing to crowds of people.

During my years at C of E, I did not do much musically except fill-in occasionally with a few different bands. It was after college that I got involved in singing with a very well known a cappella group called ‘Reunion’ (on the internet). We performed all around New York, New Jersey and Philadelphia and recorded a number of a cappella versions of popular songs.

I then reunited with a few guys I knew from high school to start the ‘Shoretone’s’ a cappella group and became one of the main lead singers. We got to perform at Radio City Music Hall in 1992 in front of close to 6,000 people. We also recorded our a cappella versions of popular songs of the 50’s & 60’s. We are still together and performing.

Thinking back to the days of my Uncle’s band I still wanted to do something with musicians. I started networking with different groups until I found a blend of guys that now make up ‘Sidewalk Serenade’. We have been together for the past 15 years performing all over the metropolitan area.

I hope that the people at our ‘East Coast Reunion’ enjoy our rendition of 50’s, 60’s and 70’s music.”

The historic landscapes, structures, objects, and archeological and natural resources at Valley

Forge are tangible links to one of the most defining events in our nation’s history. . . .The Valley Forge experience is fundamental to both American history and American myth, and remains a source of inspiration for Americans and the world.”

The park contains original buildings, a variety of programs and hiking trails. Many artifacts help visitors to grasp the incredible challenges faced by the Continental Army. Valley Forge is a significant location. Plan to make it a part of your attendance at the upcoming October 5 and 6 reunion.

Sterling College will soon observe its 125th Anniversary as an educational institution. Doors opened on Cooper Memorial College, as it was then known, on November 1, 1887.

On May 7, 2012, a delegation from the college traveled to Topeka to receive recognition from the state legislature

and meet with the Governor. The legislature adopted a resolution commending the college for 125 years of educational achievement.

OBITS

Patricia (Pat) Jane (Mallum) Orr, A50, of Lubbock, TX, died on October 6, 2011 at age 83. While at C of E, Pat's activities included serving as Dunlap Hall House president. She was a Home Economics major and a member of both Kappa Omicron Phi and the Home Economics Club. After graduation, she taught second grade. Later she had a career at Hobby Lobby, retiring in 2008. Three children and six grandchildren survive her.

Darlene Elaine (Bemis) Jelinek, Nursing '58, died May 18, 2011, at age 74 in Sierra Vista, AZ. Early in her career, she served as a consultant for the Kansas Tuberculosis and Health Association. Subsequently, she worked as a public health nurse for the New Mexico Department of Health and Social Services' Immunization Project. After completing coursework required to become a nurse practitioner and obtaining her Master's Degree, she became an instructor in the Department of Family, Community and Emergency Medicine in the University of New Mexico School of Medicine. She left teaching to open a care center for those suffering from dementia. Her unique approach was extremely successful and became a national model for residential care for Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia. She received numerous awards including the Governor's Award for Outstanding New Mexico

Women and a Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Organization of Nurse Practitioner Faculties. Her husband, three sons and four grandchildren survive her.

Rev. Thomas Elwood Miller, X60, of Emporia, KS, died July 4, 2012, at age 74. His early career was in law enforcement as a detective with the Emporia Police Department and subsequently as a special agent for the Santa Fe Railway Police. He received his pastoral license from the Assemblies of God Church, left law enforcement, took a job as managing partner of Miller Brothers Oil Company and began to serve many different denominations as both a supply pastor and an itinerate minister. In 2000 he was pastor of the Hartford Christian Church until his retirement in 2005. His wife, a daughter, two grandchildren and two great grandchildren survive him.

Sue (Weingrad) Levine, A70, of Fort Lauderdale, FL, passed away on June 12, 2007. She is survived by her husband, **Bruce Levine, A69**, and three children. Her children wrote the following epitaph. "Ever dedicated to the good of her family and friends, she will live in the hearts and minds of those who had the honor of knowing her. Her eternal spirit of happiness carries through in everyone she touched."

Scholarships Awarded

The College of Emporia Alumni Association scholarships for the 2012 – '13 school year have been awarded. Each scholarship is for one year only. However, winners can reapply annually. (One of this year's winners is a second time recipient.)

This year the Board of Directors of your alumni association took the unprecedented step of awarding seven \$2,000 scholarships instead of the usual six. This one-time circumstance arose from the fact that there was a tie for the sixth and final award.

Families where a family member is expected to be eligible for a scholarship next year (2013 – '14 school year) are urged to download a scholarship application now, at the beginning of the school year, in order to be able to procure all of the required information in an orderly fashion. Deadline to submit an application for next year's scholarships is April 1, 2013.

To obtain an application, go to the C of E website, www.c-of-e.org and click on "Scholarships." In the middle of the scholarship page, in large red letters, it says, "Download Scholarship Application Here." Click on that to obtain the application and instructions for its submission. Descendants of former C of E students, faculty and staff are eligible.

A Clarification

Here is a further explanation regarding Presby Pete and how the current drawing was selected in the 1957 contest. In the 1957 article in "College Life," the names of the final three artists were listed. The article went on to state that a final "composite" drawing was created. In

clarification, the drawing was, in fact, the work of the contest winner, Jack Rickard. He had made a number of preliminary drawings, and it was from this collection that he produced his "composite" which is the Presby Pete still in use today.



Fred Jones, X43, celebrated his 90th birthday earlier this year at Grandview Terrace, a retirement community in Arizona where he lives. His comment on the occasion of his 90th birthday celebration was, "Now they won't call me a kid where I live."

Transforming Sports

Take a moment here in the midst of the 2012 football season, and attempt to imagine a game with no passes. It probably wouldn't be nearly as exciting as the game that we are accustomed to watching.

However, before the C of E football game against Washburn, a 17 – 0 Presby victory, teams just ran the ball. In that historic 1910 game, C of E football legend **Arthur A. Schabinger, A13**, completed the first forward pass in college football history.

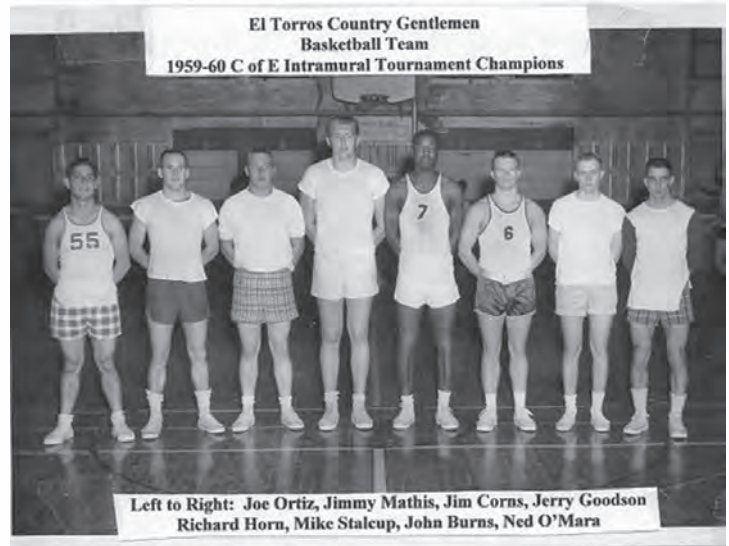
Later in the same season, Schabinger scored seven touchdowns in a record-setting 107 – 0 win over Pittsburg. (The previous state record for points scored in a single game was 105.) It's not, therefore, surprising to learn that he has been inducted into the National Football Hall of Fame and the Helms Foundation Hall of Fame. (Neither of these two organizations remains active today.) He is, of course, also in the C of E Athletic Hall of Fame.

After graduation from C of E, Schabinger embarked upon an illustrious career highlighted by his role in transforming another sport. As one of basketball's greatest innovators, he was inducted in 1961 into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, MA, as a contributor. He was also inducted in 1963 into the Kansas Sports Hall of Fame.

As one of the top basketball coaches in the U.S., he won 80% of his games and eleven conference titles in 20 years of coaching at Ottawa, Emporia State and Creighton. Perhaps more importantly, he conducted clinics throughout the U.S. and overseas, and he organized and conducted the Olympic Basketball Tournament in 1936 by which the first U.S. Olympic Team was chosen.

Schabinger was one of six coaches who conceived and organized

the National Association of Basketball Coaches and wrote its constitution and bylaws. He was its first secretary-treasurer and in 1931-32 was named president. He participated in the research, development and adoption of the molded basketball. He was the founder and director of the Official Sports Film Service from 1946 to 1956, providing graphic demonstrations designed to insure uniformity in officials' interpretations of the game's rules. Again, basketball wouldn't be the game that we know today if not for C of E alumnus Arthur A. Schabinger.

Progress at Kenyon Hall

Your alumni association's Memorabilia Chair, **Linda (Sadler) Myers, X62**, reports that work is progressing rapidly converting Kenyon Hall into apartments. The building will be renamed Kenyon Heights.

Some apartments are already laid out. Floor plans run from one to three bedrooms.

Linda reports that the apartments' "layouts are quite generous in space." Windows have been replaced and, in some cases, enlarged. Some new windows have been added as well. In the former chapel, stained glass windows have been replaced with clear glass. However, the very tops of the windows still have some stained pieces, which allow history to remain. The basement has been completely gutted, and a new main entrance is now located on the southwest side of the building. Office space, common areas and several smaller apartments are located on this lower level. Big windows have been cut and the area outside will have landscaped terraces.

Also new will be a single large elevator, located in the southwest corner of the former chapel, which will run from the basement (lower level) to the third floor.
